Post Summary

The Library of Trinity College Dublin, the University of Dublin, holds the finest surviving Dutch private library of the eighteenth century, known as the Fagel Collection. Built up by several generations of the Fagel family, the collection was a working library used by successive members of the family who held high office in the Netherlands. The entire collection of over 20,000 titles and approximately 32,000 items (books, maps, pamphlets and manuscripts) was purchased for Trinity in 1802. It includes many fine editions and its impressive range of languages and subjects is representative of the state of knowledge in Europe at the end of the Enlightenment.

With the support of the Foreign Ministry of the Kingdom of the Netherlands, and in partnership with the Koninklijke Bibliotheek (KB – the National Library of the Netherlands), the Library of Trinity College Dublin is embarking on a project to increase the discoverability of the collection, and to enhance its research potential, through comprehensive cataloguing of every book and pamphlet in it.

This role, at Assistant Librarian I scale, will involve Project Management oversight of the project – which includes seven work packages, including the conservation, cataloguing, research and outreach elements – as well as some bibliographic record creation for unique items. We require candidates with proven experience in staff and project management,

analytics and reporting, as well as in-depth knowledge of bibliographic record creation, including analysis of provenance and material characteristics.

Applicants will have a good honours degree and a professional postgraduate qualification in Information and Library Studies. The appointee will have at least 2 years' experience; preferably in an academic library and/or within the area of Early Printed Books and/or Special Collections. The applicant will have Dutch language comprehension, if possible.

This is a temporary post for two years, subject to satisfactory completion of a probation period of 12 months.

Standard Duties and Responsibilities of the Post

- 1. Project Management of the overall project, covering all work packages: this will include submitting progress and financial reports to the Government of the Kingdom of the Netherlands and coordinating and leading Steering Group, Working Group and Project Team meetings.
- 2. Line management of two bibliographers working on the project; close liaison with the project conservator.
- 3. Cataloguing unique items into Trinity's Library Management System or the KB's Short Tittle Catalogue of the Netherlands (STCN) using international standards (RDA, DCRM(B), LCSH, MARC21, Library of Congress authority files).
- 4. Developing work processes and constantly monitoring against timelines and project targets to deliver record creation for up to 32,100 items within the full project. Working with the KB on record quality assurance.
- 5. Supporting engagement and scholarship on the collection, for example by presenting the collection to potential benefactors of subsequent projects, and by submitting papers to conferences or journals.
- 6. Working with the University's office of Public Affairs and Communications, and other Trinity and KB colleagues, to actively promote the project and the collection through media and other public engagement channels.
- 7. Any other duties that arise in the course of delivering the project.

Education, qualifications, skills and abilities required of the post

- 1. A good honours degree;
- 2. Postgraduate qualification in Library and Information Studies;
- 3. A minimum of two years' experience; preferably working in an academic library and/or with Early Printed Book collections;
- 4. A proven track record of successful staff and project management, including preparing and monitoring deadlines and targets;
- 5. Skills and experience in analysis and report writing;
- 6. Expertise of computerized cataloguing standards and bibliographic description, including RDA, DCRM(B) or similar, MARC21, and Library of Congress Subject Headings;

- 7. Dutch language comprehension, sufficient for detailed cataloguing of Dutch imprints, is highly desirable;
- 8. Excellent communication skills, both written and verbal, and the ability to confidently liaise with media, government representatives, and potential donors;
- 9. Ability to organise and prioritise workload and meet deadlines while paying attention to detail:
- 10. Ability to work independently and also as part of a team;
- 11. Commitment to a project-based ethos.

Further Information

The Library has the largest collection in Ireland with over six million printed volumes with extensive collections of journals, more than half a million maps and very large collections of manuscripts reflecting over four hundred years of academic development. More recently, it has established a collection of over 80,000 electronic journals and over 350,000 electronic books. It has been a legal deposit library for Ireland and the United Kingdom since 1801. The Library continues to add to its collections through purchases, private donations, acquisitions and as a library of legal deposit.

The Library's research resources include internationally significant holdings in manuscripts, early printed material, including music and more than half a million maps. Its collections and services support the College's research and teaching community of 17,000 students and academic staff.

The Department of Early Printed Books and Special Collections has a staff of 2.5 professional Librarians and two Library Assistants. It is responsible for the management of about 500,000 volumes. The collections range from incunables to modern Anglo-Irish literature and include major strengths in Reformation pamphlets, in 17th and 18th-century Irish, English, French and Dutch imprints, and 19th-century Irish and English imprints. Among the collections which are being developed at present are Irish imprints, 18th-century French drama, French Revolution pamphlets, 19th-century English language fiction, and children's literature.

Early Printed Books and Special Collections has a 16-seat Reading Room in the East Pavilion of the 18th-century Old Library where there is an extensive reference library relating to historical bibliography. Books are catalogued in an online Sierra system in MARC21 format.







The Selection Process in Trinity

The Selection Committee (Interview Panel) may include members of the Academic and Administrative community together with External Assessor(s) who are expert in the area. Applications will be acknowledged by email. If you do not receive confirmation of receipt within 1 day of submitting your application online, please contact the named Recruitment Partner on the job specification immediately and prior to the closing date/time.

Given the degree of co-ordination and planning to have a Selection Committee available on the specified date, the University regrets that it may not be in a position to offer alternate selection dates. Where candidates are unavailable, reserves may be drawn from a shortlist. Outcomes of interviews are notified in writing to candidates and are issued no later than 5 working days following the selection day.

In some instances the Selection Committee may avail of telephone or video conferencing. The University's selection methods may consist of any or all of the following: Interviews, Presentations, Psychometric Testing, References and Situational Exercises.

It is the policy of the University to conduct pre-employment medical screening/full preemployment medicals. Information supplied by candidates in their application (Cover Letter and CV) will be used to shortlist for interview.

Applications from non-EEA citizens are welcomed.
